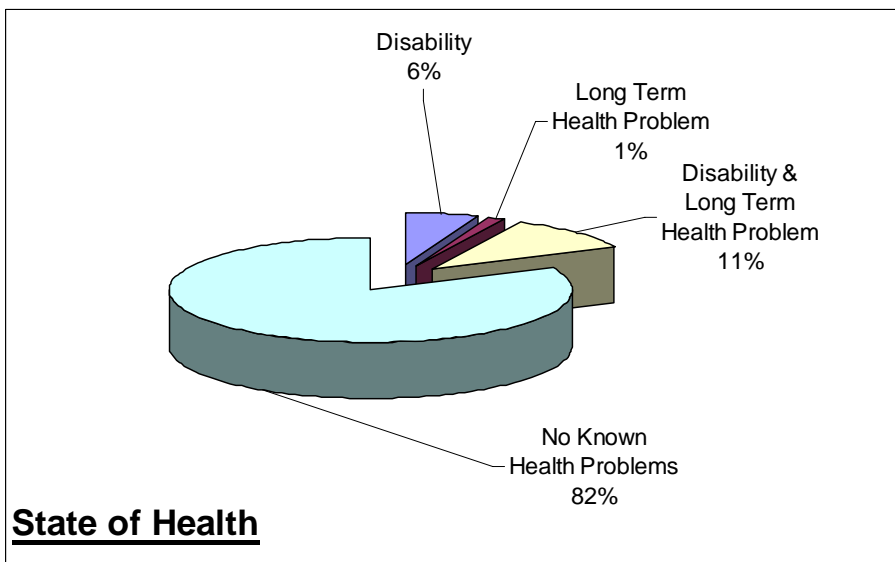
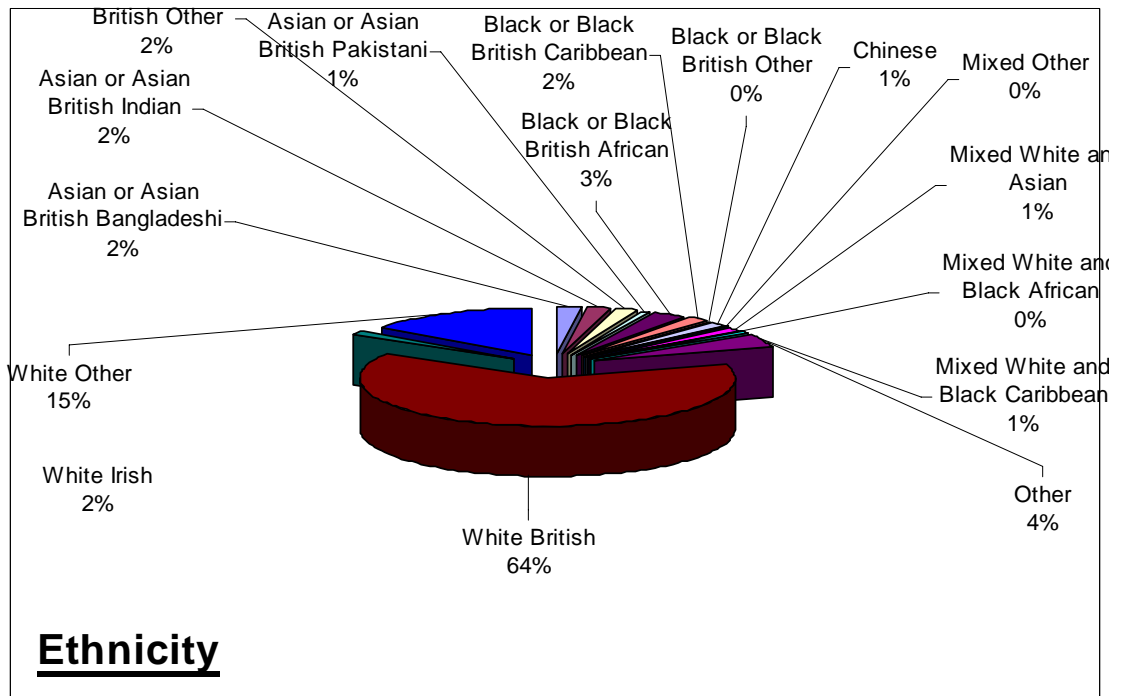
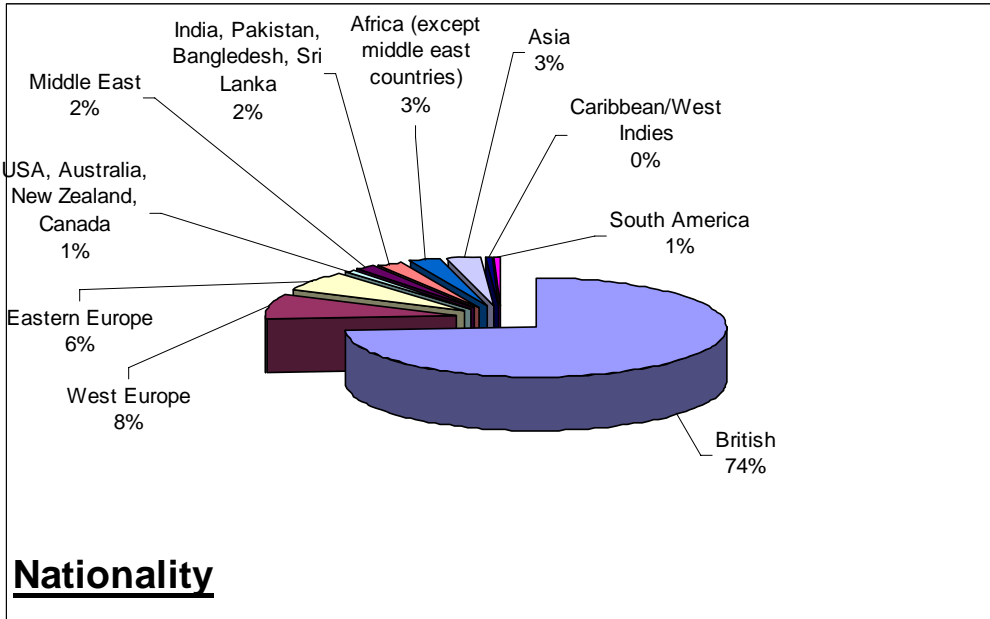
No. of contacts from Cambridge City residents during first 6 months of 06/07 = **8,536**

Total No. of questions asked by Cambridge City clients during first 6 months of 06/07 = **15,073**

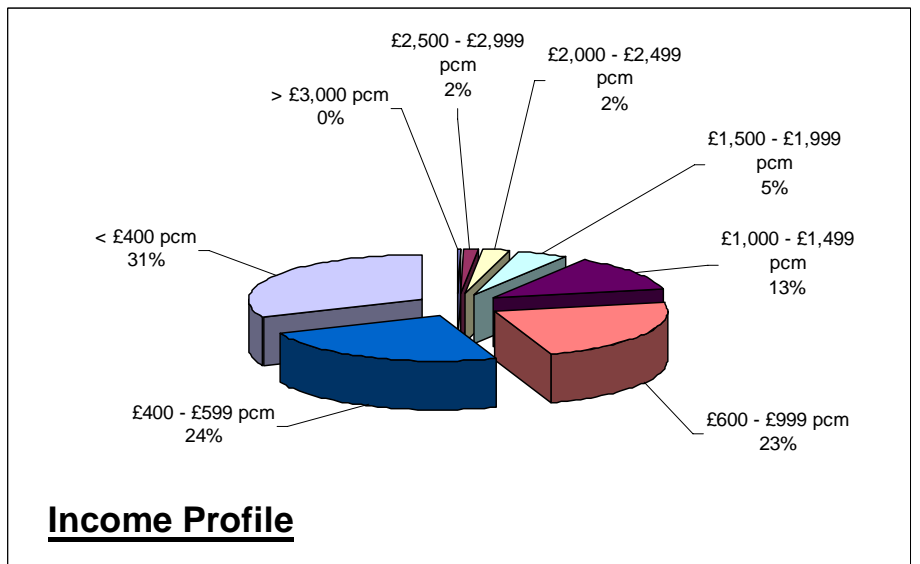
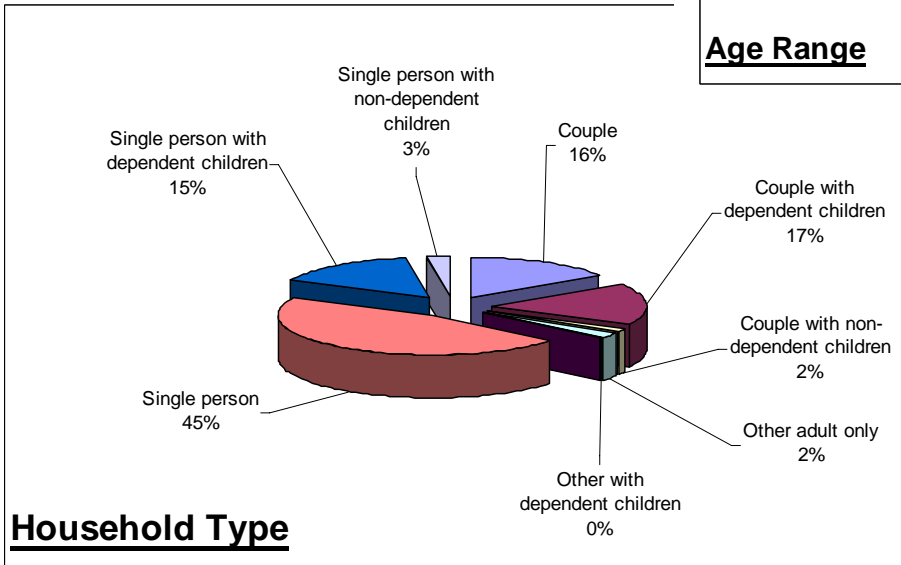
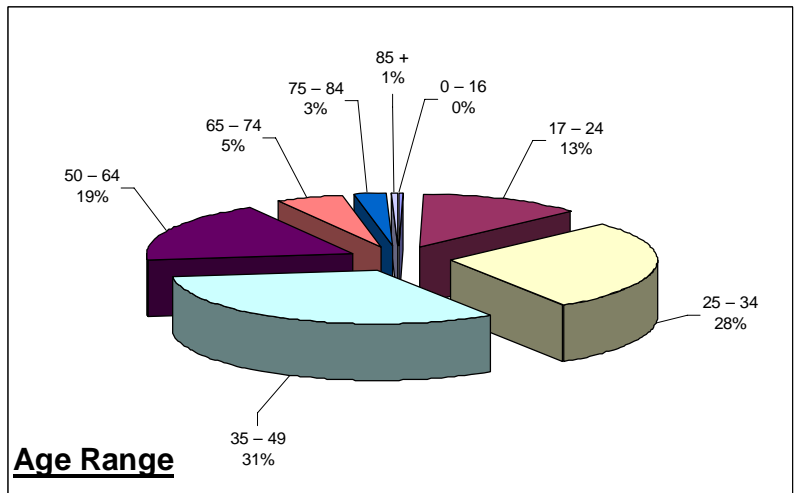
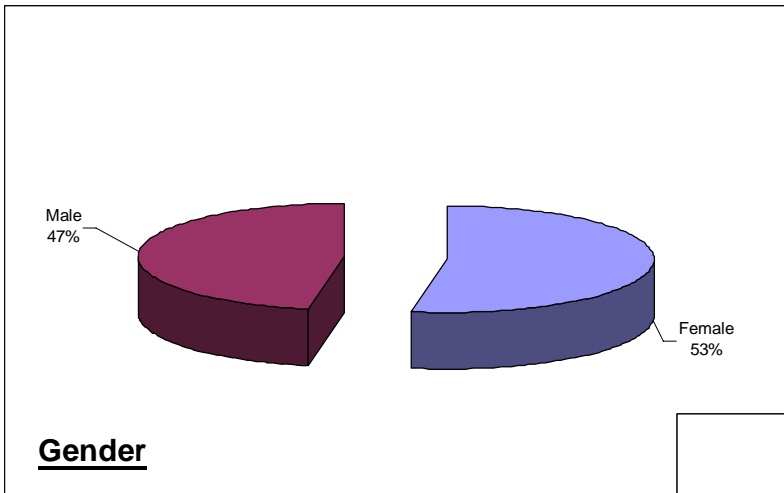


Cambridge City – CAB Client Statistics April 2006 to September 2006

Income Maximisation Campaign – In Cambridge City

The Income Maximisation Project is jointly funded by Cambridgeshire County Council and the Government Financial Inclusion fund, so that Cambridge City residents gain benefit and debt advice delivered in their community at no extra cost to Cambridge City Council.

The Income Maximisation Team includes 1 full time benefit take up case worker and 1 part time debt caseworker exclusively covering Cambridge City locations, plus access to a benefit appeals specialist and 2 more debt specialists based at our Cambridge Office and funded from the Legal Services Commission.

We also did 33 home visits.

In the first 6 months of this project our benefit take up workers have applied for £410,174 of new benefit claims for Cambridge City Residents of which 38% were either disabled, suffered long term health problems, mental health problems or were vulnerable for reasons of health.

We also helped Cambridge City residents write off £219,506 worth of debts providing much needed relief from the stress that high levels of debt causes in this region.
